CactusWorld - author guidelines

Contributions for publication in CactusWorld are invited in English on any aspect of cactus and succulent plants, and not already published or accepted for publication elsewhere. Authors are reminded that copyright must be their own, and that, for example, maps if used, must be redrawn to a high standard to avoid infringement. If using Google maps please see their requirements for attribution information that must be included.

Text should be submitted in the preferred MS Word format via email or, if too large to email, on a formatted CD-ROM or DVD-ROM disc along with all illustrations and line drawings etc. File sharing services such as DropBox, WeTransfer and similar may be used. Any graphic files, for example for charts or graphs, should also be included in any common format but please include a printed hard copy in case access/conversion is not possible. If illustrations are required to be placed near to particular parts of the text, this should be indicated on the hard copy. This positioning cannot be guaranteed, however, but every effort will be made to comply with a request.

Illustrations should preferably be high resolution digital images in either JPEG or TIFF format. Colour transparencies, drawings and maps are accepted at the owner's risk, bearing in mind the hazards of postal services, but care will be taken to ensure their safe return after use.

In common with some other journals, manuscripts submitted for CactusWorld may be reviewed by external sources before final acceptance, and once accepted and edited will go through a rigorous proofreading process. The editor reserves the right to refuse papers without explanation and to make minor textual changes without reference to the author. Bear in mind that CactusWorld caters for the whole membership of the Society and does not accept articles that are too technical/scientific or cannot be accessed by the layman. Any articles considered to be too technical may be passed on to the editor of Bradleya which is the annual yearbook of the BCSS and which publishes papers of a more scientific nature.

Authors will receive proofs and are asked to return them with corrections as soon as possible. While every effort will be made to get papers into print as soon as possible, no guarantee for a particular issue can be made, although preference is given to articles that require minimal rewriting, and those which are highly topical or include taxonomic innovations. The Journal is published four times per year; in March, June, September and December.

Authors will receive a printed copy of the published journal and a PDF of their finally paginated paper. Additional paper off-prints will be available on request.
